The calendar indicates the days of collection for waste, recycling and yard waste pickup. It provides information as to how to separate material that goes into your green bins and blue boxes, as well as information on composting and disposal of grease and hazardous waste products. It also notes special collection days, such as Christmas tree collection and how to dispose of large articles.

I would also like to include a gentle reminder to please ensure that PPE is placed in with your garbage and not in blue bins, to ensure the safety of everyone.

I'm certain you will find the answers to any questions you may have regarding our waste and recycling program within this guide. We appreciate all of your efforts to reduce waste and keep our community clean and beautiful.

Curbside collection reminders





Place garbage, green bins, blue boxes and yard waste at the curb by 7 a.m. on your regular scheduled day, but not earlier than 8 p.m. the night before. NO strapping devices.

During severe weather, pickup may be delayed. One container or item can be placed out for collection without a tag every other week. Each additional container/item requires a bag tag prominently displayed to a maximum of five-item limit. Tags are non-refundable and can be obtained at local stores, library branches and the Civic Centre.

NOTE: there is never a limit to the number of green bins, blue boxes or yard waste containers.

Acceptable containers for garbage

Plastic bags

- Must be securely tied
- No loose grocery/kitchen catcher bags
- Do not place sharp objects inside bags. Place these materials in a separate, sealed and labeled cardboard box.
- Maximum 76cm x 122cm (30" x 48")
- Maximum weight 22 kg (50 lbs)

Metal or plastic cans

- Must have 2 handles and a secure lid
- Do not use ties/bungee cords
- Maximum 50cm (20 in.) x 90cm (36 in.) and maximum 98 Litres
- Maximum weight 22 kg (50 lbs)

These items are NOT picked up:

Hazardous and biomedical waste; household paints, solvents and pesticides; syringes and needles; car parts and tires; propane tanks; and construction/ demolition waste. Disposal information for these items can be found throughout this calendar, or by calling 1-866-665-6752.

Plastic recycling bags & blue box netting

You may have noticed plastic recycling bags and blue box netting for sale in your local retail stores. Please be advised that the Town does not permit recycling in plastic bags or netting on blue boxes. The plastic and nets can accidentally be caught in the waste collection equipment posing a hazard to the waste collection workers.

BLUE BOX PROGRAM

To assist in the continued success of the Town's Recycling Program, and to ensure your blue box material is picked up, we kindly remind you of the following:

- Size of acceptable container 50cm (20 inches) in height and 50cm (20 inches) in width or length
- Sorting of materials is not necessary
- Make sure your blue box is easily visible at curbside. Do not stack garbage bags or containers on top.
- Must be curbside no later than 7 a.m. on your designated collection date. *Time of the day for collection in your area may be changed at anytime, without notice.
- No garbage, plastic bags or food shall be put in the blue box.
- Blue boxes and green bins can be purchased at all municipal libraries and at the Civic Centre.
 *Remember: You must bring in your broken/ damaged blue box or green bin to ensure replacement at no charge. Please rinse all containers prior to returning them.

USER PAY GARBAGE PROGRAM

Our user pay garbage program allows each household one container/item to be set out without a tag and up to four more with tags to a maximum of five items. Garbage tags must be prominently displayed to ensure collection. NO strapping devices are permitted.

Some points to remember when putting out your garbage:

- All items must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on the day of collection or no earlier than 8 p.m. the night before collection.
- Disposable bags designed and sold for the purpose of containing garbage shall not exceed the size of 75 cm (30") by 100 cm (48").
- Rigid refuse containers are to be reusable metal or plastic, and shall not exceed the size of 50 cm (20") in diameter and 90 cm (36") in height and also must have handles and a lid.
- Total weight of any full can, container or bag cannot exeed 22 kgs (50 lbs).

YARD WASTE PROGRAM

The Town of Georgina has banned the use of plastic bags for yard waste collection as required by the Region of York. Approved containers are open topped, regular garbage container, reusable containers, or kraft paper bags intended for that purpose. Twigs and branches should be tied and bundled (with string only) in lengths no greater than 90cm (3').

*Kraft paper bags, unlike plastic bags, can be composted along with the yard waste and produces a much higher quality compost.

No grass clippings.

Yard waste can be delivered to the **York Region Transfer Station** at 23068 Warden Ave. or to the Miller Compost Site in Richmond Hill at 1351 Bloomington Rd.

WHITE GOODS AND METAL ITEMS PICKUP

To arrange for white goods pick-up: Residents must contact Green for Life at **1-866-421-5625**. *Each item requires a garbage tag prominently displayed.

Georgina will now accept:

- Aluminum foil, trays, and plates
- Empty metal paint cans (lid removed)
- Empty aerosol cans
- Gable top containers such as milk cartons
- Aseptic packaging including juice boxes
- All rigid plastic food containers

 Tags are not required for: The blue box, bag tag exemption days (limit of 5), leaf and yard waste days, and Christmas tree pickup days.


SEAWEED

Seaweed will now be collected bi-weekly as yard waste. Rigid containers can be used. *Please drill holes in bottom to drain water.

White Goods Examples:

Refrigerators, stoves, washers, dryers, metal bathtubs, hot water heaters, freezers, barbecues (no propane tanks), swing sets, bicycles, and lawn mowers. To arrange a special curbside collection, please contact Green for Life at 1-866-421-5625.

Other large articles: Chesterfields, chairs, tables, desks, etc. *Non-metallic shall be placed at the curb on your regular garbage day, with a garbage tag prominently displayed, prior to the 7 a.m. guideline.



To help make waste and recycling pickup as easy and efficient as possible, residents are reminded of the following:





 Do place items at the end of the driveway/curb so they are visible to the operator collecting them.





• **Do not** leave items half way up the driveway for operators to collect.





 Do bundle items in your blue bin and place heavier items on top to prevent them from blowing away and littering the street.





 Do not place bins and garbage bags on top of or behind snow banks in the winter.



Yard waste

Yard Waste is collected WITH RECYCLING EVERY SECOND WEEK from April to November, as noted throughout this calendar (there are some exceptions due to statutory holidays).

There is no limit on the amount of yard waste that can be placed for collection, providing that acceptable labeled containers are used (yard waste stickers are available at no charge).





Acceptable containers:

Place weeds, plant trimmings, and leaves in paper yard bags or any regular garbage container that has handles.



Bundle branches as shown. Use twine only, no ropes please.









These items should NOT be placed with yard waste:

Kitchen scraps, grass clippings, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, larger branches, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood and animal droppings.

Imagine how it feels to be surrounded by trees and forests – the cool shade, the aromatic smell, the feeling of escaping time as you connect with nature. Now imagine always having that at your fingertips.

If you own property in York Region, we can help you rekindle your connection with nature by planting a tree or forest on your property.

Tree planting programs include:

- Low-cost backyard do-it-yourself and full-service planting
- Full-service, large scale planning and planting
- Do-it-yourself bulk seedlings

Non-native invasive plants are species that have been introduced into areas outside of their native range. Dog-strangling vine and garlic mustard are two common invasive plants you may find on your property or in your garden.

If left alone these aggressive plants can take over your garden making it difficult for anything else to grow, including native flowers which provide food for important pollinators like the Monarch butterfly.

To make sure this doesn't happen to you, learn how to:

- Identify invasive plants
- Control and remove invasive plants
- Plant native flowers to attract birds and butterflies to your garden






FIGHT THE BITE! AGAINST BLACKLEGGED TICKS AND LYME DISEASE

What is Lyme disease?

· Fatigue or

weakness



Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria called Borrelia burgdorferi which is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

Symptoms of Lyme disease may include:

- A skin rash
 Fever or chills

 - · Dizziness or confusion
 - Muscle and joint pain
- Headache Swollen lymph nodes


See your health care provider if you develop symptoms of Lyme disease after a tick bite or after visiting a wooded or brushy area.



- Ticks are small bugs that feed off the blood of animals and humans
- · Adult ticks are the size of a sesame seed and nymphs are the size of a poppy seed
- Ticks are found on tall grasses and bushes in wooded areas
- They can attach and feed up to five days

Protect yourself in wooded or brushy areas

- · Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved clothing and closed footwear
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- · Walk in the middle of trails
- · Shower when you get home
- · Check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks
- Remove attached ticks as soon as possible



If you find a tick on you or or a family member remove it quickly




- 1. Grasp the tick with tweezers as close as possible to your skin and pull it straight out
- 2. Do not put anything on the tick or try to burn it off
- 3. Disinfect the area with rubbing alcohol
- 4. Visit etick.ca for FREE tick identification

Recap needle and place into approved sharp container offered free of charge at any participating pharmacy.





Once the sharp waste has reached the designated fill line, snap lid closed by securing the strip.






To permanently close the sharps container, insert the tab into the opening to secure the lid down.



Always use an approved sharps container when disposing of used sharps to help reduce the risk of needlestick injuries.

FIGHT THE BITE! AGAINST WEST NILE VIRUS

What is West Nile virus? West Nile virus is spread to humans from the bite of an infected mosquito.

How to protect yourself when outdoors

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved shirts and pants
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- Cover up at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active



How York Region protects you

York Region's West Nile Virus Program includes larviciding over 100,000 catch basins during the summer and using mosquito traps to capture and test for West Nile virus infected mosquitoes.



Mosquito-proof your home

- Clean up areas of standing water around your home
- Ensure door and window screens are tight-fitting and in good repair
- Clean up pools / pool covers
- Turn over wading pools
- · Empty out flower pots
- Clear eavestroughs, storm and roof gutters
- Clean bird baths weekly

What is Household Hazardous Waste?



Household hazardous waste (HHW) is anything in your home that is corrosive, explosive, flammable or poisonous and is no longer needed. It should be brought to a HHW depot where it will be disposed of safely.

Examples of HHW:

- Aerosol cans (full or partially full)
- Batteries
- Cleaning products
- Cosmetics
- Fertilizers
- Fluorescent light bulbs and tubes
- Gasoline (containers may not be returned)
- Glues and adhesives
- Nail polish and polish remover
- Paints (liquid and solid)

Paint thinner and varnish remover

- Perfume and cologne
- Pesticides, insecticides and herbicides
- Pharmaceuticals
- Propane cylinders/tanks
- Pool chemicals
- Sharps (needles/syringes) must be in puncture proof container
- Used motor oil and filters

Residents can drop off 60L of household hazardous waste and 20 compact fluorescent tubes per household per day.

What is Electronic Waste?



Electronic waste (e-waste) is any electronic equipment in your home that no longer works and cannot be repaired. E-waste should not be thrown in the garbage as these items contain materials considered to be hazardous.

Examples of e-waste:

- Cables
- Cameras and camcorders
- Cell phones, telephones, pagers and fax machines
- Computer towers*, laptops*, tablets*, modems, keyboards and mice
- Game systems
- Monitors*, printers*, scanners* and typewriters
- Televisions*
- VCRs, DVD players, radios, stereos, speakers

*Residents may bring two televisions and four units of computer equipment per household per day. Disassembled electronics will not be accepted.

Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) can clog your pipes and our sewers when poured down the sink, drain or toilet.

Fats, oils and grease include:

butter and margarine, meat fats, salad dressings, cooking oils (including deep frying oils), sauces, gravies, shortening and lard.

Proper Disposal

- Fats, oils and grease should be allowed to cool and harden, then scraped into the green bin
- Use a small amount of paper towel to help wipe and absorb the liquid before placing it in your green bin
- Liquid cooking oil can also be dropped off at a York Region waste depot to be recycled

What goes in the green bin?

Green bin tip: Lining your green bin with compostable bags is no longer mandatory but is the preferred option. **Please refrain from using plastic bags to ensure collection.**

Food and food scraps

If you can eat it, it goes in the green bin, as well as fish/meat bones, shells, fat, grease and lard (solidified), small amounts of cooking oil (can be placed in milk cartons), baking supplies, dairy products, egg shells, coffee filters/grounds and tea bags, corn cobs/husks, and nuts/shells.

Soiled or shredded paper

Shredded paper may be placed in the green bin in small amounts. Other paper products that go in the green bin include; butcher and cheese paper (no waxed or plastic liner), microwave popcorn bags, flour and sugar bags, muffin paper, soiled paper plates, paper towels and tissues, paper serviettes, and any non-waxed paper or cardboard that contains food residue (sauce, cheese, etc). **No waxed paper**.

Personal care items

Diapers, hair, nail clippings, sanitary products, tampons, incontinence products, tissues.

Pet products

Animal bedding, pet waste, kitty litter, bird seed, pet food, pet fur, feathers and sawdust (wood sources only).



Metal item recycling • bulky item pick-up

Large metal items

Large metal items such as appliances, barbecues (no propane tanks), bed frames, furnaces, hot water heaters, metal bath tubs, storage sheds, and bicycles must be recycled. To arrange a special curbside collection, please contact **Green for Life** at **1-866-421-5625**.

*Please Note: For safety, remove doors from fridges, freezers, and ovens. Each item requires a garbage tag prominently displayed.

If a special collection is not booked, metal items will not be collected. Metal appliances and scrap metal can also be dropped off at select York Region Depots. *See page 3 for details.

Furniture, mattresses, box springs, plastic lawn furniture, toilets, carpeting, etc.

Items to be placed at curbside for pick up on your regular garbage collection day. Please break down or separate large/heavy items, if possible. Bundle small loose pieces. Tie carpeting and linoleum in rolls measuring no longer than 1.2 metres (4 ft) and weighing less than 20 kilograms (44 lbs). Each piece or bundle counts toward the one (1) item limit.


