

Keeping your cat contained to your property is in the best interest of your furry friend. Here are some reasons why and some tips to help.

Cats that live or spend time outdoors are susceptible to disease and the dangers of predators, traffic and extreme weather.

Did you know that if your owned cat is found off your property and not under your direct supervision, any person may trap or pick up your cat and turn it into the Animal Shelter? For an owner to claim their cat from the shelter they must provide proof of ownership, present a valid form of government issued photo identification, and pay all associated fees incurred during its stay.

Spayed or neutered cats are less likely to roam or cause a nuisance. Have you heard about P.A.W.S of Georgina? They are a registered charity helping animals and wildlife in our community. Part of their mission is to promote responsible pet ownership. If you are a resident of Georgina you may apply to their program for a rebate on the cost of spaying or neutering your pet. Indoor cats can be happy cats

- · Fresh food and water
- · Clean litter box for each level of your home
- Scratching and climbing structures
- Rest, relaxation and safety
- Play opportunities, puzzle feeders, treat balls

Tips to contain your escape artist

- Greet your cat away from the door
- Smack the door with a rolled up newspaper. This will train your cat that the door is not a nice place
- Dilute orange or lemon juice and spray around the bottom of doors. Cats dislike citrus
- Puzzle feeders
- Provide a rich and stimulating environment
- Collar with tags, microchip and recent

photographs are essential in the event your cat does get outside

Receiving unwanted visits?

If you are a resident of Georgina receiving unwanted visits from neighbourhood cats, consider approaching your neighbours to see if they are missing their pet.

To prevent cats from lingering, **do not feed them**. If the cat does belong to someone it is more likely to go home if it isn't receiving food elsewhere.

Help reunite cats by visiting our Facebook page and helpinglostpets.com to see if the cat has been posted as lost or missing. Call the Animal Shelter to see if we have any lost reports that match.

If the cat is friendly but does not appear to belong to anyone in your area, please contact **Animal Control** at **1-855-898-8605** for safe and humane options for removing cats.





Spotting a Feral Cat

If the cat appears to be unfriendly, avoids human interaction, is missing its ear tip(s) and/or has been hanging around for many months without leaving, this cat may be feral or part of a local Trap Neuter Return (TNR) cat colony.
